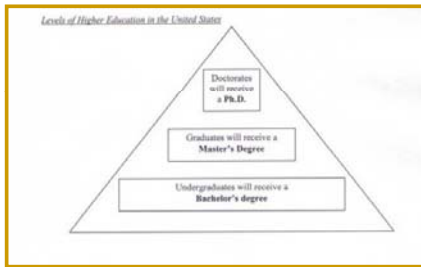

AAS Degree Sheets

- To Graduate from CSN with a two-year degree.
- Use the CSN Degree Sheet ONLY If you are going to graduate from CSN with a two-year Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree.
- AAS degrees are not designed to transfer to a four-year program.

AA/AB/AS Degree Sheets

- To transfer to UNLV or another 4-year college or university.
- AA Degree Sheets have basic general education and lower level classes in the major area.
- AA Degree Sheets are specifically designed to transfer to UNLV, but can also be used to transfer to other 4-year institutions.

A Word About Electives

- An "Elective" is a class that you choose.
- All degree programs require "elective classes", but you decide which classes, the program does not make you take a specific elective class.
- Some programs require electives in a specific area of study.
- All programs have different elective requirements. It is recommended to read the school catalog to determine the degree requirements for your major.

Hints to Help You Graduate/Transfer

- Consider taking PSC 101 instead of HIST 101 + HIST 102 or 217
- "D" grades do not transfer
- For AAS degrees, "D" grades in your specialty area will not count toward your degree
- Eng 113 & 114 will transfer to Nevada schools, but MAY not transfer out of state
- At CSN, if a lab has a credit value of 0, it must be taken at the same time as the science class.
- Degrees that have no major (General AA, AGS, AS) are NOT eligible for practical training
- Classes that end in B won't transfer (ex. MATH115B)
