When are these courses offered?

EMT and AEMT courses are held at the Green Valley Technology Center, except for weekend classes, which are offered at the West Charleston Campus. **Note:** The AEMT program is not offered during the summer semester. Refer to the current semester class schedule to confirm course availability, locations, and meeting times.

Can I enroll in both the EMT and AEMT programs at the same time?

No. The College of Southern Nevada uses a stepladder (sequential) approach for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) training.

EMT courses (EMS 108B/L & EMS 150B) are open enrollment and available to any CSN student who meets the program's eligibility requirements. These courses provide instruction in basic emergency medical care skills.

AEMT courses (EMS 115B/L & EMS 116B) provide advanced emergency medical care training. To be admitted to the AEMT program, you must:

- Successfully complete the EMT training sequence (EMS 108B), and
- Have current EMT certification issued by the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT).
- Email a copy of your NREMT certification to EMS Program Director, Braiden Green, at Braiden.Green@csn.edu for permission to enroll

Do I have to take an exam after completion of the courses?

Yes. After successful program completion, students must take the appropriate National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT) certification exam. A fee of approximately \$120 may apply.

Students must earn a cumulative course grade of 80% or higher, including a minimum score of 80% on the final examination, to be submitted for course completion through the Southern Nevada Health District and the NREMT. EMT and AEMT graduates may attempt the NREMT exam up to **six times within two years** of program completion. Students may test before age 18, but cannot be licensed or employed until age 18.

Drug Test, Background Check, Uniform, CPR, etc.:

Detailed information on drug testing, background checks, uniforms, CPR, and other requirements is available in the EMS Student Handbook. Students should wait until one to two weeks before the semester begins, when the EMS program will email official instructions. For questions and additional information, contact ems@CSN.edu.
